YOUR RIGHTS AS A VICTIM OF A VIOLENT CRIME

In order "to ensure the fair and compassionate treatment of victims of crime, to increase the effectiveness of the criminal justice system by affording rights and considerations to the victims of crime, and to preserve and protect victims' rights to justice and fairness in the criminal justice system," the State of Mississippi guarantees certain rights to victims of violent crimes. Victims of felonies involving physical violence, the threat of physical injury, a sexual offense, or any offense involving spousal abuse or domestic violence are entitled to the following:

- information from the law enforcement agency responsible for your case regarding
 emergency and crisis referrals, the availability of victims' compensation, the officer's
 name and agency contact information, the procedural steps of a criminal prosecution, the
 rights authorized by the Mississippi Constitution, including a Request to Exercise
 Victims' Rights form, the existence of and eligibility requirements for restitution, a
 recommended procedure if the victim is subjected to threats or intimidation, and the
 name and telephone number of the office of the prosecuting attorney to contact for
 further information.
- to be notified of all charges filed against the defendant, and any criminal proceedings, other than initial appearances, as soon as practicable.
- an opportunity to speak with the prosecutor prior to the beginning of the trial, including the expression of the views of the victim regarding a nol pros (dismissal), reduction of charge(s), sentence recommendation, and pre-trial diversion programs.
- to a final disposition of the criminal proceeding free from reasonable delay.
- to be present at all criminal proceedings.

- to have a separate waiting area from and minimal contact with the defendant, the defendant's relatives, and defense witnesses.
- to have the prosecutor petition the court that you or any other witnesses not be compelled to testify at any pre-trial proceedings or at trial to any facts concerning identity, residence, or place of employment that could cause a danger to those who have been threatened or intimidated.
- to be notified of the date of conviction, acquittal, or dismissal of the charges filed against the defendant. If the defendant is convicted, the victim shall be notified of the existence and function of the pre-sentence report, the name, address, and telephone number of the office which is preparing the pre-sentence report, the right to make a victim impact statement, the right of the defendant to review the pre-sentence report, and if the court orders restitution, the right to pursue collection of the restitution.
- to submit a written victim impact statement or make an oral victim impact statement to the probation officer for use in preparing a pre-sentence report.
- to be notified of the sentence imposed on the defendant as soon as practicable.

- to be given by the Attorney General's Office or the District Attorney's Office the status of any post-conviction court review or appellate proceeding within five business days after the status is known.
- to be notified by the sheriff or municipal jailer, upon request, of the release on bond of a defendant. To be notified, upon request, of the escape and return of the defendant / prisoner into custody.
- to present an impact statement or information that concerns the criminal offense or the sentence during any entry of a plea of guilty, sentencing, or restitution proceeding. The right of the victim to be heard may be exercised, where authorized by law, at the discretion of the victim, through an oral statement, or submission of a written statement, or both.
- to have property which was taken during the course of an investigation returned to the victim as soon as possible, or to be notified by the law enforcement agency responsible for the investigation why the property will not be returned.
- to be notified, upon request, of the upcoming release of the prisoner fifteen days prior to the end / expiration of a sentence, or fifteen days prior to a medical release. If the prisoner dies while incarcerated, the victim shall be notified, upon request, within fifteen days.
- to be notified that he or she can submit a written statement, or audio or video recording, which shall be entered into the prisoner's Department of Corrections record, and shall be considered during any review for community status of the prisoner prior to release of the prisoner.
- to be notified and allowed to submit a written or recorded statement when parole or pardon is considered.
- to testify in a criminal proceeding or participate in the reasonable preparation of criminal proceedings without loss of employment, intimidation, or threat or fear of the loss of employment.

These rights do not include the right to direct the prosecution of the case. The prosecutor will confer with the victim and consider the victim's wishes, but the prosecutor ultimately decides how a case should be handled.

In order to assert the rights listed above, a victim must provide the appropriate prosecutor with a signed Request to Exercise Victims' Rights form, which is to be provided to the victim by the law enforcement agency investigating the case.

VICTIM COMPENSATION GENERAL ELIGIBLITY GUIDELINES

- The crime must be reported to law enforcement officials within 72 hours after the crime or show good cause for not reporting.
- Application must be received within 36 months after the date of the crime. In cases of child sexual abuse, the application must be received within 36 months after the crime was reported, but not later than the victim's twenty-fifth birthday.
- The victim or claimant must fully cooperate with law enforcement investigation and prosecution.
- The victim must not have contributed, provoked or in any way caused the injury or death; such claims may be denied or reduced.
- All other sources of payment such as insurance, Medicaid, Medicare and Workers' Compensation must pay first.
- Other limitations apply.

WHO MAY BE ELIGIBLE?

- Individual must be the victim of a violent crime who has suffered personal injury, death or extreme psychological trauma as a result of the crime. Types of crime include: assault, child abuse, domestic violence, DUI crashes, hit & run, homicide, sexual assault, stalking and kidnapping.
- Dependents of a deceased victim or person authorized to act on behalf of dependents of a deceased victim.
- Persons authorized to act on behalf of the victim if the victim is a minor or is incapable of acting on his or her behalf.
- Family members of the victim who have mental health expenses related to the claim.
- Persons who have funeral expenses for the victim(s).
- A Mississippi resident who is a victim in a foreign country which does not provide compensation funds.
- A person who witnessed a violent crime and suffered extreme psychological trauma.

WHO IS NOT ELIGIBLE?

- A victim who engaged in illegal conduct.
- The offender and/or the accomplice to the offender.
- Anyone injured in a motor vehicle incident unless the vehicle was used by the offender (1) intentionally as a weapon, (2) in a hit & run, (3) while driving under the influence (DUI), (4) in an attempt to flee from law enforcement, or (5) causing injury to a child in the process of boarding or exiting a school bus in violation of §63-3-615.
- Anyone incarcerated in a penal institution when the crime occurred.
- A victim or claimant who, after the injury for which an application with the Division is filed, is convicted of any felony and the conviction becomes known to the Division.
- *A victim/claimant who has three previous felony convictions.
- **A victim/claimant who has been under the supervision of any department of corrections within 5 years prior to the victim's injury or death.
- * Applies to claims based on crimes that occurred <u>prior</u> to July 1, 2013.
- ** Applies to claims based on crimes that occurred on or after July 1, 2013

INELIGIBLE EXPENSES

- Stolen and/or damaged property.
- Pain and suffering.
- Attorney fees.
- Other limitations apply.

ELIGIBLE EXPENSES

- Medical expenses up to \$15,000 per claim.
- Transportation costs to obtain medical and/or mental health services that are at least 45 miles one way from the victim or claimant's residence, up to \$500 per claim.
- Funeral expenses, up to \$6,500 and transportation costs to make arrangements and attend funeral, up to \$800 per claim.
- Mental health counseling for the victim and victim's family members, up to \$3,500 per claim.
- Lost wages for the victim, up to \$600 per week for 52 weeks; not to exceed \$20,000 per claim.
- Lost wages for the claimant, when the claimant had a loss of earnings in order to assist victim during recovery of injuries, up to \$600 per week for 52 weeks; not to exceed \$20,000 per claim.
- Lost wages for claimant to make arrangements and attend funeral, up to \$600 per claim for one week.
- Loss of support for dependents of a deceased victim, up to \$600 per week for 52 weeks; not to exceed \$20,000 per claim.
- Loss of tuition
- *Domestic violence temporary housing assistance, up to \$500 one time benefit.
- **Domestic violence relocation assistance, up to \$2,000 one time benefit.
- Court related travel reimbursement, up to \$1,000 per claim.
- Repair/replacement costs for damaged exterior windows, locks, doors and/or other security devices of a residential dwelling, up to \$1,000 per claim.
- Crime scene cleanup, up to \$1,000 per claim (assaults & homicides only).
- Expense verification is required.
- Overall maximum award for expenses incurred is \$20,000.
- Other limitations may apply.
- * Request for this benefit must be made though a domestic violence shelter, a law enforcement officer, prosecutor or judicial officer.
- ** Request for this benefit must be made through a domestic violence shelter.
